If your assigned advisor does not have appointment availability that suits your needs, please email them directly, rather than scheduling with an advisor who is not assigned to you.

Nancy Nguyen, Administrative and Event Assistant



Mental Health Conference



Pride Month

What is Pride?

Pride is an annual celebration within the LGBTQ community primarily held during the month of June. Though it has roots in earlier celebrations and awareness periods held by various LGBTQ groups, the first official Pride march/parade (officially known as Christopher Street Liberation Day) took place on June 28, 1970 as a commemoration of the Stonewall Riots which occurred a year earlier.



How is Pride celebrated around the world?

The celebration of Pride varies around the world—while many countries celebrate in June, others may base their celebrations around a significant event in their own country's LGBTQ history. Pride celebrations also range from being more politically-oriented—such as a march or protest—to being more of a celebratory event—such as a festival or a carnival.
